Gods and Goddesses

ZEUS [Jupiter, Jove]: Son of Cronus [Saturn]; king of the gods and ruler of the sky; arbiter of human

destiny. Tried to remain neutral.

Aphrodite [Venus]: Daughter of ZEUS and Dione; favors the Trojans.

Apollo: Son of ZEUS and Leto; favors the Trojans.

Ares [Mars]: Son of ZEUS; favors the Trojans (always sided with Aphrodite) until he switched

sides.

Artemis [Diana]: Daughter of ZEUS and Leto, favors the Trojans.

Athena [Minerva]: Daughter of ZEUS; favors Greeks.

Hephaestus [Vulcan]: Son of ZEUS and Hera; favors the Greeks.

Hera [Juno]: Daughter of Cronus and wife of ZEUS; queen of the Gods; favors the Greeks.

Hermes [Mercury]: Sone of ZEUS; favors the Trojans.

Poseidon [Neptune]: Son of Cronus; king of the sea; favors the Greeks.

Thetis: A sea nymph, wedded to a mortal, Peleus; mother of Achilles.

God of the river Scamander: Also called Xanthus: favor the Troians.

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The Epic Poem: The Iliad and The Odyssey

A Greek named Homer is credited with writing (speaking) the first great epic poems.

It is believed that he lived between 900-700 B.C.E. Little is known of him for certain, but it is believed that he was blind. We do know for certain that he was one of the greatest storytellers who ever lived!

What is an epic poem? It is a long narrative poem which relates the extraordinary deeds of legendary national heroes.

Characteristics:

- 1. It begins with an **INVOCATION** (prayer) to the Muses (Goddesses of the Arts) which asks for divine inspiration for the storyteller (poet).
- 2. The theme of the poem is stated almost immediately.
- 3. The plot begins "in medias res" (in the middle of the story).
- 4. There are numerous and lengthy speeches given by the characters in the story.
- 5. The poem includes extensive repetition of epithets, phrases, and events.
- 6. The device of **flashback** is used to supply necessary background information.
- 7. Various **gods and goddesses often intervene** in mortals' affairs.
- 8. Great emphasis is placed on the value of **cunning and prowess**.
- 9. The poem's climax occurs when the chief **antagonists face each other** in hand-to-hand combat.
- 10. Epics contain lengthy, complicated plots with extraordinary characters who perform extraordinary deeds.
